1,602 healthcare workers, distributed accross 4 countries: France, Spain, Italy and Germany

- 400 doctors
- 402 nurses
- 401 caregivers
- 399 paramedics and other medical/paramedical staff (support care)


While the vast majority of healthcare workers feel "rather" regarded (66%), 1 in 3 claims not to be. A feeling that varies between professions: 84% of doctors vs. 56% of caregivers.














This feeling of being valued is shared by the majority in all countries: from 73% in Italy to 59% in France.

Feelings of consideration vary greatly depending on who you talk to: from more than 80% among the immediate circle of carers to 34% among politicians.

For 1 in 2 European healthcare workers, however, the feeling of consideration has deteriorated over the past 5 years.



Conversely, for healthcare workers who feel they are more and more considered, the increased consideration is primarily due to the shortage of healthcare workers, which helps to understand their essential role.






Q4. What do you think explains why, over the past 5 years, healthcare workers are more and more considered? Base: Healthcare workers who feel they are more and more considered (n=371)





However, nearly 8 out of 10 healthcare workers report being satisfied with their current job


















The majority of European healthcare workers would also advise a young person to take up their profession














1 in 5 European healthcare workers is considering a career change.
